## Message from the President, Friends of Olympic National Park

Happy Summer to the Friends of Olympic National Park! What a bittersweet spring this has been, given the devastating loss of the Hurricane Ridge Day Lodge, offset by the exciting happenings within our Friends group.

In the wake of the Hurricane Ridge fire, the FONP Board met briefly with Superintendent Sula Jacobs at our monthly meeting on May 18<sup>th</sup>. A brief discussion ensued regarding how the Friends could best support Olympic National Park and staff at this time. Sula thanked the board for emotional support provided for the staff and administration to date. Given how early in the investigative process it is, and where we are in the tourism season, Sula verbalized that right now money is not the primary concern, but rather communication to our visitors that Olympic National Park is not closed due to this event. Instead, there are nearly a million acres to enjoy and explore this summer.

The FONP Facebook page offers a tremendous platform for disseminating this type of information. Our members have already graciously participated in discussions regarding alternative hikes that offer great views like Hurricane Ridge. We will continue to post in that vein throughout the summer, to offer alternative sights in the park and best ways to access them. This may help prevent the onslaught of visitors to the Lake Crescent and Marymere Falls parking lot, such as occurred over this holiday weekend.

- On April 29<sup>th</sup>, FONP participated in the National Junior Ranger Program Day at the Main Visitor Center, details of which are contained within this newsletter. ## Friends of Olympic National Park Volunteer Activities



## Friends of Olympic National Park <u>Historical Perspective: Hurricane Ridge Lodge</u>

Hurricane Ridge sits at an elevation of 5242 ft and offers unparalleled views of the interior of the Olympic Mountains. It is a major attraction in Olympic National Park both summer and winter. In the summer, people visit for the spectacular views, wildlife, wildflowers, hiking trails, and picnicking. In the winter, skiing and snowshoeing are available 3 days/week (Friday – Sunday) on most weekends. Until recently, the main permanent facility at Hurricane Ridge was the day lodge. It provided general information about the park (displays, 3D map, and a short video), concessions (food service and gift shop), and park rangers (providing information and assistance to park visitors).

The Hurricane Ridge Day Lodge was designed by National Park Service architect, Cecil Doty. He created the design in 1949, and the Lodge was dedicated by Congressman Henry M. Jackson on September 22, 1952. The Lodge was part of a plan by Park Superintendant, Fred Overly, to increase park visitation. The lodge offered a nearly 270-degree panorama of the interior Olympic Mts. Doty's lodge design was reminiscent of Norwegian mountain lodges with added Native American art motifs from the Pacific Northwest.

Initially, the lodge was accessed via a gravel road that started near Whiskey Bend along the Elwha River and climbed to Hurricane Ridge from the west. Roughly 5 years later, the current paved road was opened, allowing much easier access to the Ridge. The original gravel road from the Whiskey Bend area was subsequently converted to a hiking trail, which still exists to this day.

Tragically, on May 7, 2023, the Hurricane Ridge Lodge was destroyed by a fire. The timing was especially unfortunate as the building was slated for an \$11 million renovation and structural rehabilitation that was just getting underway. The origin of the fire is still unknown; investigators continue to study the site in order to make that determination. The road to Hurricane

foreseeable future while investigations continue. Once investigations are complete, clean-up will begin in order to make the area safe for visitors. Only then will the road to Hurricane Ridge be re-opened to visitors. The timing of re-opening remains unknown.

### National Junior Ranger Day ONP Visitor Center, Port Angeles April 29, 2023

On April 29 volunteers from Friends of Olympic National Park (FONP) participated in National Junior Ranger Day at the Olympic National Park (ONP) Visitor's Center in Port Angeles. National Junior Ranger Day is a one-day celebration that is part of the annual National Park Week and is also part of the National Junior Ranger Program. At the Junior Ranger Day event there were participants from ONP and several other organizations with fun activities to teach kids about the Park and how to protect the plants and animals of the Park.

FONP Volunteers had a booth that helped teach kids about the "10 Essentials" for recreating in the Park and other wilderness areas. Kids had to search around our FONP "campsite" set up in our booth and identify all of the 10 Essentials using a checklist. We also had several types of water filters on hand with buckets of water, so kids (and some parents) could learn about the importance of filtering water before drinking from streams and lakes in the Park. Our FONP volunteers enthusiastically shared their experiences of wilderness adventures and their knowledge of various tools that can be useful when camping.

For those kids that successfully completed the activity they were rewarded with a carabineer and a colorful bear sticker. The smiles on the faces of the kids was a real treat for all of us manning our booth. All of the kids were super excited to go into our tent, pump water from one bucket to another and be able to choose a sticker to take home.

Thanks so much to our volunteers Ray Weinmann, Rich Havel, John Hamlin and especially our most enthusiastic, young volunteer Caitlyn for making this event very fun and successful. FONP Board Members Jenny Murphy and Dori Broglino also helped out at the booth.




